- The original Region V was composed of seven states, which defined the geographical area of MAEOPP: Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Minnesota, Ohio and Wisconsin.
- The addition of Missouri, Kansas and Nebraska (MO-KAN-NE) in 1979 nearly doubled the size of the region. This also led to a diversification of the region. The region now serving, not only the urban poor, mostly African-American and Hispanic individuals, but also the rural poor, increasingly non-black and female individuals.
- MAEOPP now represents Regions V and VII and is the second largest EOP/TRIO association in the United States.





Illinois State Chapter Update

My decision to attend Iowa was a choice I could not have imagined a year ago. The University of Iowa was nowhere on my radar. I decided to apply my senior year because a few of my friends had been accepted. A few weeks later I received my acceptance letter and a few months later I received my financial aid package, which to my surprise was a full ride! At that point it was a decision of whether to attend a smaller college or go to Illinois, a much larger school. Visiting Iowa sealed the deal. From the moment I stepped



onto campus I knew this would be my home for the next four years. It had a cozy setting, a select body of students and Engineering faculty that seemed to be working to boost the college's diversity. A sad fact about the field of engineering is that men of color are disproportionately underrepresented. Only 3 percent of the 1.5 million male engineers in the United States are black. These statistics can be discouraging, but I use them as motivation to break barriers in the profession.

Looking back on my
experience in the Upward
Bound (UB) program at
Dwight D. Eisenhower High
School, this is one experience
I would not trade for the
world. I'll be honest, as a
freshman I took many of the
opportunities that UB
presented to me for granted.
I hadn't come to appreciate
what the program was doing
for me and other students. I
believe that without UB, I

wouldn't be where I am today. The program helps by providing free services designed to improve ones academic, career and personal skill set; to help complete high school, prepare for college and the workforce. The UB program also helps with personal development and cultural awareness. Through this program I have been fortunate to travel places that I otherwise might not have ever seen. But what I respect most are the UB staff. It takes a special person to help young adolescents during such an important and confusing time in their lives. I commend people like Mr. LeRoy Peters and Ms. Misty Williams. The world would be a million times better if we had more people like them and more programs like TRIO Upward Bound. They really help students to succeed, and I am very happy to have participated in this program. TRIO does work!

Indiana State Chapter Update

Eric Mahmoud was at the zoo with his grandson when he stopped at the impala habitat and noticed the east-African deer were separated from freedom by just a 3-foot-tall fence. Mahmoud knew from TV nature programs that an impala has a remarkable 10foot vertical leap, yet these animals dutifully stayed inside their enclosure, seemingly unaware of their own abilities.

The same attitude often applies to bright yet underprivileged kids who don't reach their potential. On Saturday, February 28, 2015. Mahmoud, the founder of a successful network of Minneapolis charter schools, spoke to youths and parents who were gathered for the



University of Notre Dame's annual TRIO Parent & Student Leadership Conference on the Notre Dame campus. The conference has marked National TRIO Day each year since 2003.

"Are you behind a 3-foot fence because you have a fixed mindset, not a growth mindset, thinking that because you were born with a certain intelligence, that's all the farther you'll get?" Mahmoud asked in a challenge to the students.

Mahmoud drew attention in Minneapolis as the founder of several highly successful charter schools that dramatically raised test scores among low-income students by requiring them to spend 35% more time in the classroom than conventional schools. But on Saturday, he told would-be college students they will need more than just academic knowledge to succeed, listing five less-tangible ingredients for success: resilience. willingness to "break the rules," the ability to compensate for

shortcomings, an "unreasonable" attitude and a "growth mindset."

All those traits, Mahmoud said, encourage students to be revolutionary innovators instead of settling for mediocrity. And the ultimate goal is for the students to enter college, find jobs and bring those skills home with


"We really want to teach, motivate and inspire our children, that once they get these college degrees, get jobs, use those skills to come back and help the community," he said.

Mr. Aaron A. Payment was the keynote speaker at the MI-CAPP Educational Foundation Banquet. Mr. Payment is chairperson of the 42,000-member Sault St. Marie (MI) Chippewa Indian tribe. Initially

a high school dropout he later earned his G.E.D., is currently working on his Ph.D. in Educational Leadership, and served for 16 years as an Upward Bound summer counselor at Lake Superior State College. He encouraged students not to give up on themselves and to take advantage of all of the resources that TRIO provides.

In addition to the 16 Chapter scholarships awarded at the banquet, MAEOPP's Silas Purnell Scholarships were awarded to Janae Chunn and Carolina Brito; ELI Scholarship to Lauralee Redmond, and Board of Directors Scholarship to Cindy Ramirez. Each was for \$1,000.






 $m{T}$ he Wichita Business Journal will recognize for the first time local
