Conference on Saturday, February 27, 2016.



The Minnesota chapter would like to recognize and honor Debra Carrow, former Director of Southwest Minnesota State University Upward Bound, who passed away in August 2015.

Debbie had passion for education, often telling others "Education is the key to success." After nurturing her own children, Debbie became a first generation college student. The year her youngest child entered

kindergarten, Debbie entered college. She earned her bachelor's degree from Southwest Minnesota State University in Marshall and continued on to receive a Master's Degree in counseling from South Dakota State University in Brookings, SD.

Her dedication to helping others and her commitment to education motivated Debbie to introduce the Upward Bound program at SMSU in 2008 by writing the initial grant. The program allowed her to nurture more than 100 first-generation college students — beginning in 9th grade — into college.

As she did with her own children, Debbie gave a little piece of herself to each student in her program, making sure they had the tools necessary to be successful in life.

Omaha-area TRIO programs, including Creighton University celebrated their successes and gave back to the community with a week full of events culminating on February 27th, National TRIO Day.

An assemblage of student services and outreach programs administered by the U.S. Department of Education, TRIO serves intermediate, secondary and post-secondary students who identify as first-generation, low-income or disabled. TRIO programs like Upward Bound and Talent Search help students reach their full potential academically, with an eye to improving not only the students' economic standing, but also helping students inspire others in their communities.

Creighton hosted the #IAMTRiO Conference on Feb. 27, pulling in all TRIO participants and organizations to talk about such topics as scholarships, the college admissions process, selecting a college, transitioning from middle to high school and creating a résumé. Ean Garrett, an author and chief innovation officer of the Infinite 8 Institute, an Omaha-based educational and social impact consulting firm, delivered the keynote address at the conference.

"Creighton is proud to be able to host our fellow TRIO participants in what is sure to be an excellent, inspiring conference after a week of uplifting events," said Shannon Teamer, TRIO director in Creighton Student Support Services. "All week, Creighton TRIO students are going to be connecting with the next generations of college students, talking with lawmakers and spreading the word about how TRIO programs are at work in their lives."

TRIO Week began Feb. 22 with the kickoff for the TRIO Donation Drive, taking place through Feb. 26 and gathering necessary items to benefit five area community organizations: *the Open Door Mission, the Heart Ministry Center, the Salvation Army, the Nebraska Humane Society and the Heartland Hope Mission*. Several area middle and high schools were involved in the drive, along with Creighton University, the University of Nebraska at Omaha, Metropolitan Community College and Nebraska Methodist College.

The week also featured a Twitter and letter-writing campaign to government officials on Feb. 23, engaging policymakers on how TRIO has made a difference. Feb. 24, a #IAMTRiO Selfie Day encourages TRIO participants to connect on social media and celebrate TRIO Programs. On Feb. 25, TRIO Works Day featured TRIO college students who visited high schools and middle schools

to talk about their experiences. There was also a visit to the Nebraska State Capitol to visit with lawmakers.

On Feb. 26, the donation drive wrapped up and the final donation numbers were announced at the #IAMTRiO Conference.

The SSS Leadership Council sponsored activities to celebrate the positive impact of TRIO programs, reflect on the importance of educational opportunity, and act to protect and further access to higher education for first-generation, low-income and students with disabilities. Highlights of the week included a snow tubing trip to Ft. McCoy, documentary showings of "A Walk in My Shoes: First Generation College Students," a firstgeneration student panel, a brown-bag discussion: Supporting and empowering students with disabilities, letter writing to **Ron** Kind and Jennifer Schilling in thanks and support for TRIO programs, and a volunteering opportunity where students and staff volunteered at the WAFER Food Pantry. It was a week filled with learning and fun opportunities!



The University of Wisconsin-Superior celebrated TRIO Day on Friday, April 22. The 2016 theme was "TRIO: A Tradition of Respect, Integrity, and Opportunity." A panel discussion featuring students in SSS and McNair gave UB students insight on college life. Additionally, UB students took part in a mock college class with Dr. Khalil Dokhanchi and discussed topics from foreign policy to tax law. Numerous students and faculty from McNair, SSS, and UB were recognized for their dedication to TRIO. UWS Professor of Legal Studies, Dr. Maria Cuzzo, delivered the keynote address, highlighting why Tradition, Respect, Integrity, and Opportunity are integral to TRIO now and into the future.

Upward Bound at UW-Superior joined other UB programs in Brainerd, Minnesota, for TRIO Day 2016. Students participated in workshops focusing on social media, studying abroad in college, and tips to reduce stress. Our students enjoyed meeting other students like themselves and visiting the regional college fair with a dozen campuses represented. Additionally, the yearly postcard campaign let students share with our elected officials how TRIO has impacted them and why continued funding is so important. The highlight of the day was gaining leadership skills from motivational speaker **Rick Rassier**. Playing 4-way tug-of-war and 10-person jump rope, Rick brought students outside their comfort zone and helped them "take it to the next level." They learned about

perseverance as well, how not to give up in the face of impossible odds.
