TRIO includes eight programs targeted to serve and assist low-income individuals, first-generation college students, and individuals with disabilities to progress through the academic pipeline from middle school to post-baccalaureate programs. TRIO also includes training programs for directors and staff of TRIO projects

Educational Opportunity Centers

Population served: Adults 19 years or older, pursuing postsecondary education as a first generation and lowincome student.

- Academic Advising
- Personal Counseling
- Career Workshops
- College Application Assistance
- Test Preparation
- Financial and Economic Literacy Activities

Talent Search

Population served: Students ages 11-27, pursuing postsecondary education who come from disadvantaged backgrounds such as low- income and first generation.

- Academic, financial, and career counseling
- Tutoring services
- Exposure to college campuses
- Assistance in completing college admissions process
- Publicize and assist with financial aid applications

Ronald E. McNair Post-Baccalaureate Achievement

Population served: Undergraduate students from underrepresented populations who wish to pursue graduate education.

- Seminars and workshops to prepare students for graduate study
- Assistance with graduate school admission processes

Student Support Services

Population served: Students between the ages of 13-19 who have completed 8th grade and qualify as low-income or potential first-generation college students.


- Summer programs consisting of intensive math and science training
- Year-round counseling and advising
- Exposure to university faculty who do research in math and science
- Computer training
- Scientific research conducted under the guidance of a faculty or graduate student mentor.

Veterans' Upward Bound

Population served: Veterans who meet military service requirements stipulated in the authorizing statute and who are low-income, prospective first-generation college students who are preparing to enter a postsecondary institution.

- Intensive basic skills development for GED completion
- Refresher classes for subjects required in college
- Academic, financial, and personal counseling
- Tutoring services
- Assistance in completing college entrance and financial aid applications
- Assistance in securing veterans' services.





As a person with a learning disability, he was selected to participate in Student Support Services TRIO funded program called Student Excellence and Leadership (SEL).

Nadir suffers from a processing delay which makes new environments difficult, thus his first couple of weeks in college where overwhelming. Fortunately, SEL's Summer Bridge program gave him the opportunity to create relationships with different staff members and peers that lead to his future success. Being surrounded by people who come from a similar background allowed him to create connections and have someone to turn to on the difficult days.

"I would not be where I am today without the strong educational support throughout my life including that which I received from SEL. My adoptive parents were told that I would function at a secondgrade level and today I have two college degrees and a resume that can compete with anyone."

Today Nadir is participating as an AmeriCorps volunteer with City Year Seattle King County. He works in a third-grade classroom to help students just below grade level succeed in math.

Anna then was encouraged to apply to be a McNair Scholar. McNair provided her the opportunity to solidify her career interest through exploration, and research and networking. It gave Anna the opportunity to work with several different professors on varying research topics. Through these experiences, she learned an immeasurable amount about how to research, how to write, how to present, and how to organize, all skills she currently uses daily. It is through McNair that Anna narrowed her interest to the causes of the academic gap between racial groups, which lead her to an interest in School Counseling. After graduating with her B.S. in HDFS and a Chicano/Latino Studies Certificate she was accepted to several Master's program to further her education and passions. Anna received her M.S. in Counseling Psychology with an emphasis in School Counseling in 2010. She has since moved back home, and is working for her community in the very school system of which she was a product of.


ASPIRE Student Support Services UW-Stout



Josephine joined UW-Stout in 2009 after graduating from Chippewa Valley Technical College with an Associate of Applied Science degree in Information Technology – Network Specialist. At 34 years old, a wife, a mother of 2, working part time, and a recent immigrant from Kenya, she struggled at Stout because she did not have a community due to time restrictions from other obligations.

In 2011, she joined the McNair Scholars Program which changed her life. The major impact for Josephine was to have a family in her cohort that supported each other and shared experiences

For her graduate studies, she partnered with Los Alamos National Laboratory's Math and Science Academy to investigate and apply measures to improve use of classroom technologies in seven Native American schools in Northern New Mexico. In 2017, she established Espanola TechHub Inc, a non-profit organization supporting local middle and high schools in STEM education. The TechHub seeks to provide resources for students to improve their math proficiency, conduct and publish research,

as well as STEM applications in a Makerspace.





She enrolled at Ripon College and majored in Biology and Chemistry and earned Dean's List status in several of her semesters while taking a rigorous set of S.T.E.M. courses throughout her academic career.

"McNair has given me more confidence in my skills in the lab after my summer research."

She was recruited by the Ripon College U.S. Dept. of Education McNair Scholars graduate school preparation program. Elle was paired with a faculty member to undertake a research project on the effects of high or low doses of retinoic acid on the skeletal development of zebra fish larvae, using another model organism (rotifers) as the food source for the zebra fish. Elle was accepted in to a wide range of Doctor of Pharmacy programs and selected UW-Madison as her choice to continue her graduate education.

Instantly, he knew that this was his calling—to give back to a wonderful program. Currently, Ryan is in his second year of being a peer mentor for the incoming SSS class. When he thinks about how TRIO (through SSS) has affected him, he wonders where he would be without it.

Before TRIO, he was a student who was lost, unsure of what he wanted to do, and not sure if he could even graduate. He was a first-generation college student who had financial need. However, after making some pivotal decisions in his life, in part due to SSS, his undergrad career has drastically improved. One of Ryan's biggest goals was raising his GPA. He stated, "I told myself that I was going to graduate with honors and receive Magna Cum Laude (3.6 GPA)." When he made this goal, his GPA was below a 3.0. Through hard work, dedication, and utilizing resources from the SSS office, he brought his GPA to 3.544.

Ryan recently found out he will not be able to receive Magna Cum Laude for graduation. Disappointed he did not reach his goal Ryan stated, "Even though I was not able to reach my goal, I improved my academics which opened many doors for myself beyond my college experience."



Presidential Inauguration

Superior, WI: Six local high school students are gearing up for a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to visit Washington, D.C., for the Presidential Inauguration of Donald J. Trump on January 20, 2017. These students are members of the Upward Bound program at UW-Superior and were selected to attend the inauguration from a competitive internal essay application process in October 2016.

While in Washington, students will tour the Smithsonian museums, the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum, and Arlington National Cemetery. They will also plan to visit with Senator Tammy Baldwin in her Congressional Office. The highlight of the tour will be watching the inauguration ceremonies for the 45th President of the United States and the Inaugural Parade. The group has been selected for special ticketed entrance through Senator Baldwin's office.

Upward Bound Director Angie Hugdahl noted that for many students, a tour to Washington would not be possible.
