"I went from having to say goodbye to my mother and my grandparents in Italy, to having to adapt to an entirely different society and system. When I moved to Madison, it was the first time I traveled to another country alone. The TRIO staff at Madison College became my first support system. Because of TRIO, I was able to reach goals that I never believed were achievable. I was nominated for Student of the Year and completed the Madison College Honors Program. I was president of the TRIO Student Board, a Phi Theta Kappa International Honors Society member, and a WiscAMP Scholar. I was nominated for several scholarships and awards and had the opportunity to engage in research at UW-Health and the Forest Products Laboratory. One of my biggest accomplishments was to transfer to Tufts University. This past summer, I was accepted to the Johns Hopkins Summer Internship Program (SIP), where I conducted research on Alzheimer's disease in the Institute of Computational Medicine. I've been part of the Tesco Lab at Tufts University, where I am continuing my research on Alzheimer's disease and have been already offered a job as a lab technician/researcher, post-graduation. After graduation, I plan to attend medical school and begin my training as a medical researcher while helping to bridge the disconnect between minority communities and the healthcare field. All the great opportunities that I've found along my academic and life path would have not been possible without the support of TRIO."

To be honest, I do not know where I would be in my life without the TRIO program. The TRIO program provided financial support through academic scholarships and guidance and mentorship







"SSS has given me a home within the UWL campus. My advisor and the staff in the SSS office have empowered me to set goals for myself I previously thought unattainable. I never considered the possibility of pursuing a degree beyond my bachelor's, and with the support of my advisor I'm setting my sights on graduate school. She also helped me navigate two major declarations and reconfigured my four-year plan countless times. It's because of SSS I am more confident in my abilities, I am a better student, and I'm a better peer. I'm in the process of becoming a peer coach and pursuing a double major in Psychology and Biology."



I HAD OPPORTUNITES TO GROW



"TRIO has been a resource that has nurtured skills and abilities that have been there, but I did not know how to fully bring to the surface. I knew I wanted to go to graduate school. I have always been a quizzical person and I knew a higher degree would help to foster my curiosities, but being a first generation student of color, with a history of trauma, the next steps to that goal was something extremely foreign to me. Since becoming a McNair Scholar, I have had opportunities to grow like I never thought possible. This program, family rather, has aided me in becoming a better sociologist, friend, and prospective graduate student. I am now at the tail end of my undergraduate career and I have the honor of deciding between two fully funded PhD offers at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and at the University of South Carolina. Did I work my butt off? Absolutely. But it was the emotional, financial, and physical assistance and guidance from McNair that ultimately got me to this point."

"Growing up in a rural area of Minnesota can be challenging, especially when you are one of the only students that comes from an underrepresented minority group. However, these challenges did not stop me from pursuing a college education. At the University of Minnesota Duluth (UMD), where I began my studies in the biological life sciences, I grew a strong bond to one of my professors and now mentor, Dr. Allen Mensinger, a McNair advisor for the University of Wisconsin Superior (UW-S) McNair Program. UW-Superior; McNair Scholars He recognized my passion for science and urged me to consider applying for the program. I applied and in November of 2015, I was accepted to the UW-S McNair Program.

McNair supported my first independent research project investigating the visual sensitivity differences in two species of Lake Superior fishes. Additionally, the McNair Program also provided me with support to present this research at the National American Fisheries Society meeting during the summer of 2016. After the completion of my first research project, they then provided me with support to travel with Dr. Mensinger to the Marine Biological Laboratory (MBL) in Woods Hole, MA to conduct neuro electrophysiology research on marine fishes.

The results of my research would eventually lead to my first first-author publication, which was published in the Journal of Neuroscience Methods. I was able to present this research at the 2017 Society for Integrative and Comparative Biology Meeting. When applying to the Integrated Biological Sciences (IBS) Master's program at the University of Minnesota Duluth, I also received the DOVE fellowship, which has provided full support for the first year of my graduate studies at UMD. I was the first African-American student to be accepted to the program since it began over 10 years ago, and the first in the program to have received this prestigious fellowship.

Upon entering UMD, I would never have thought that I would be where I am today. I am extremely grateful for the opportunities the McNair Program and its mentors have provide me with thus far. Recognizing this, I hope to one day be able to becomea mentor within the McNair Program and provide support and mentoring to young underrepresented students, so they too may be able to pursue their passions.





"In 2009, I spent 40 days in jail and another 2 months in a halfway house/treatment facility on The Red Cliff Ojibwe Reservation. It was a result of an alcohol-related offense during a period of probation. Simply put, I wasn't doing that well in life. Within a year of my release, I followed the suggestions of my father, who had always wanted to see me finish a college degree. Enrolling at the University of Wisconsin-Su-

perior, I learned of the McNair Scholarship Program and duly applied. Following the excellent advice from the McNair staff and my faculty mentor, I was able to finish a graduate-level research project. From the encouragement of my mentor Deborah Schlacks, PhD, and the McNair program staff, especially Marsha Lue, EdD, I submitted an abstract of my work on F. Scott Fitzgerald and the emerging automobile industry to an international academic conference. I was honored to receive an invite to participate. The McNair program was probably the biggest factor in my life's trajectory in the last 25 years. The program's design of stretching possibilities helped me harness my own desires in more constructive ways. Since graduating, I've worked exclusively as a free-lance writer and more recently as a performing artist. About to embark on a multi-state tour with an employee, I can only imagine

how much smaller my dreams would have been without the earnest encouragement of the McNair program. I wouldn't be where I am without them. The examples they set for me and others are keys I've used to open new doorways into endeavors that seek to contribute to community while feeding my own sense of destiny."

"After three years of not knowing what I wanted to do, I decided to take some time off from school. I made the decision to return to school in the fall of 2017. The first time I was here, I occasionally came to a class, left as soon as it was done, and wasn't interested in being apart of school. This time, I spend the majority of my day on campus, studying and doing homework, and I have made an effort to talk to my professors when I have questions. Even applying for the McNair is something I never would have seen myself doing in the past. McNair is an amazing opportunity that will benefit me in so many ways.

First, it is giving me the opportunity to step out of my comfort zone and challenge me in new ways. I will be going to events, conducting my first research project, and presenting my results to different audiences.

Second, it is going to help me determine if research is something that I have a passion for.

McNair Scholars Program will help me determine if this is what I would like to do in the future.

Lastly, and most importantly, the McNair Scholars Program is giving me the opportunity to be a part of something bigger. 
